Narrow opening day defeat for Woking RFC Raynes Park RFC 25 vs Woking RFC 24

Woking RFC started their 23/24 Surrey Counties 5 league campaign with an agonising defeat away to Raynes Park. Despite losing skipper Jacob Woods to illness on the eve of the match, Woking under new Head Coach Mark Rose and with several new faces in the match day squad went into the tough season opener confident that all the hard work over summer would see them perform well.



Unfortunately, such optimism proved short lived as from the kick off Woking found themselves on the back foot with their kick off going straight into touch. With a clear game plan of utilising their large pack to keep the game tight and dominate the set pieces Raynes Park dominated the visitors in the early exchanges. Struggling in the scrums Woking conceded multiple penalties which allowed the hosts to camp on the Woking line. Despite some brave defence Raynes Park drove over for a converted try.

Not long after, more indiscipline saw Woking reduced to 14 men as debutant Jawad Sobhani saw yellow for cynically denying a try scoring opportunity for not retreating. Raynes Park opted for the scrum and went over. Conversion missed.

Slowly Woking were able to move up the pitch thanks to the efforts of stand in skipper Chris Wallis, John Dickie, and Jordan Baker. However, as a team Woking were struggling to find any cohesion or rhythm to their play. As the half approached its conclusion and no sooner had Woking returned to full strength Raynes Park were awarded a penalty try as Alasdair Hamilton-Wilkes infringed at the line out denying another try scoring opportunity.

With time running out Woking found some much-needed urgency and got themselves within 15m of the Raynes Park goal line. As the host conceded a penalty, quick thing by scrum half Chris Wallis saw him tap and go, catching several defenders off guard to go in under the posts. Aitcheson converted.

Following the confidence boosting try before the break and some instruction from head coach Mark Rose Woking came out a different team. They upped their intensity and started to play to their strengths of spreading the ball wide to stretch the game and run the much larger Raynes Park pack around.

The match was much more evenly balanced. Raynes Park were struggling to contain the pace and direct running of the Woking back line. Centre Jordan Baker was proving to be a handful along with full back Keihlan Watson who was running everything back when the opportunity presented itself.

Woking scored their second try following good defensive play which saw the ball bounce fortunately from a tackle for Baker who collected cleanly and managed to hold off the covering defenders to score from 30m out. Watson added the conversion.

With the game in the balance Woking conceded a penalty that Raynes Park converted before more good play by Mike Aitcheson saw him make a break to feed Chris Wallis in support who managed take the ball up field before a quick one two with Aitcheson that saw him score his second of the game. Aitcheson converted. Both sides exchanged penalties meaning it was now a one-point game.

As Raynes Park looked to see out the game Woking were running out of time to get the decisive score and seal a dramatic comeback win. With just a couple of minutes left the Woking pack did well to turnover the ball which gave the backs a platform to attack from depth. Good hands again saw the ball end up wide to Jordan Baker who drew the last defender and feed the overlapping Keihlan Watson only for the pass to be adjudged as forward.

However, Woking were given an unexpected opportunity to win the game as the Raynes Park forwards conceded a late penalty as they looked to manage the final play of the game. Facing his final and most difficult kick of the day Mike Aitcheson stepped up only to drag his effort wide much to the relief of Raynes Park.

Watching from the sideline skipper Jacob Woods said, 'The passion and determination the boys showed to get back in the game was immense. After a challenging start with everything going against them, they showed real character to drag themselves back into contention when not playing well. The truth is they were unlucky to be on the losing side as we dominated the second half. If we get our act together and play to our full potential, we are going to surprise a lot of teams this season'.

Woking travelled up the A3 to visit familiar opposition in Merton RFC. Despite some of the lop-sided results when the two sides have met in the last couple of years, this match from the offset looked like it would be one of the hard-fought battles separated by a couple of points that this fixture has often thrown up and it did not disappoint.



Woking kicked off with the slope and from the start put pressure on their hosts. Merton in a bid to slow the game down ended up giving Woking several penalties which allowed the visitors to build from set piece. However, Woking failed to capitalise, and it was Merton who struck first with Woking conceding a couple of sloppy penalties which allowed the home side to get up field and within range for a shot at goal to open the scoring 3-0.

Not allowing their heads to drop, Woking went back downfield and continued to pressure the Merton defence with strong running from the back row of Phil Price, Josh Claydon and Jacob Woods as well as the threat in the backline from Carl Jacobz and Keilhan Watson. This soon paid dividends with a grubber through a gap from Jacobz was hacked on by Price and then missed by the Merton fullback which allowed Price to score. The conversion was missed making it 5-3 to Woking.

Woking continued their pressure and a penalty from a scrum at close range allowed Jacob Woods to take a tap and crash over making the score 10-3. Merton hit back immediately with some strong work through their forwards to bring the score back to 10 each.

It was almost Merton who went into half time leading when a dangerous break by their wing looked to be a certain try, however heroic cover defence from Oscar Dower, Jawad Sobhani and Finn Rowe got Woking into half time with honours even.

Playing up hill second half, Woking knew it would be a challenge. However, both forwards and backs stepped up to the mark. Not much could divide the sides in the first 15 minutes until a stroke of individual brilliance from fullback Watson saw him rip the Merton defence apart and score under the posts, the conversion was added to take the score to 17-10. A shot at goal would have taken Merton into the lead, however to Woking's surprise their enthusiastic second row took a quick tap penalty. Not only was he held up over the line, but he also failed to tap the ball which resulted in a Woking free kick and despair for the Merton players and supporters alike.

A Woking clearance found an isolated Merton winger who was surrounded by Keiron Hale, Josh Claydon and Rhys Parker and had no choice but to hold on and concede a penalty. Woking cleared even further up field and after the lineout won another penalty for Merton infringements at the ruck. After being camped in their own 22 for much of the last ten minutes, Woking ended the game in the opposition 22 with Rhys Parker putting the ball dead for full time and the win.

Jacob Woods commented after the game: "Just what we needed as a side. Everyone stood up as individuals today and played as a team for the win. If we can maintain a consistent side selection and build on the hard work at training, I have no doubt more wins will come".

Woking secured back-to-back league wins for the first time in 5 seasons as they ran in nine tries to see off Wandsworthians RFC at Byfleet Rec. The hosts backed up their win away at Merton the previous week to consolidate their position in the top half of Surrey Counties 5.



On a perfect afternoon for rugby the hosts scored within the first 30 seconds as Josh Claydon collected the kick off and lead the charge forward. Woking recycled several phases before releasing their backs to devasting effect which saw full back Keihlan Watson receiving the ball out wide to cruise in unopposed. Mark Rose converted.

Rose successfully converted 3 of the 7 second half tries.

After the match captain Jacob Woods said, "It was great to build on last week's victory and despite doing our best to level things up in the first half the boys regrouped to put in the best performance of the season so far. It is great to know we have plenty of room for improvement and it was great to welcome back some injured players and more fresh faces. Woking RFC failed to make it a hat trick of Surrey Counties 5 victories as they came out second best to London French in Barnes. With both sides level on points in the league Woking travelled with confidence having won their previous two matches, although frustratingly were only able to name a squad of 16 due to injury and unavailability.



Woking kicked off but was the hosts who took control of the early exchanges as they looked to move the ball out wide at every opportunity. However, solid Woking defence and poor handling from the London French backline in tricky conditions meant the early storm was weathered without too much of a scare.

Gradually, the Woking forwards started to get on top dominating the scrums and winning penalties at the breakdown thanks to good play from the back row of Jake Sines, Jacob Woods, and Josh Claydon. At the end, reflecting on the match Woking skipper Jacob Woods said, 'Today wasn't a true reflection of our quality and I am disappointed. With key players missing or unavailable the boys who played today gave everything, but it wasn't enough. We have a week off now to recover and get ready for our final 2 fixtures before the Christmas break. Despite having the lion's share of possession in the second half and the luxury of a long subs bench, Mitcham still could not gain the upper hand and were repeatedly denied by a defiant Woking team intent on giving their opponents nothing without working for hard for it.

Where they could Woking kept their opponents honest by offering an attacking threat when in possession of the ball. With 15 minutes remaining Woking capitalised on Mitcham's profligacy and scored a well taken breakaway try as wing Gareth Nearn was fed by centre Finlay Rowe to outsprint several defenders from 40m out to score. Mark Rose made it 2 from 2 to bring the scores level.

Despite their best efforts to finish the game off, Mitcham simply could not get the score to kill the game off and end Woking's spirited and determined resistance. The visitors with time running out could have snatched the victory but were either let down by indiscipline at the breakdown or poor execution with players out on their feet.

Having watched from the sidelines skipper Jacob Woods, commented "What a performance from all who pulled on the Woking shirt this afternoon. Nothing was left out there and to a man everyone contributed to a performance to be proud of individually and as team. It was a case of what might have been after Woking slipped to defeat on the road at Surrey Counties 5 league leaders Reigate RFC. A THUMPING WIN FOR WOKING

Woking RFC 79 vs Croydon RFC 17

Saturday at the Byfleet rec was a grey day, with internationals keeping spectators and players away it was a quiet but determined start for both sides of 15 men without substitutes.

A similar start to the season's earlier fixture between Croydon and Woking ensued with both teams carrying the ball hard into contact in a tight attritional game.

With injuries on both sides, each team was down to 14 men, which, although keeping the numbers even, increased the space for Woking's backline flyers. Another three tries before half-time set an impossible task for Croydon.

The second half started with another Croydon player leaving the field to make it 14 v 13 and with Woking's Carl Jacobz at 13 and winger Charlie Goddard determined not to let Keihlan score all the tries the scene was set for a display of ruthless try scoring around the edges. WOKING RFC 15 vs LONDON FRENCH RFC 19

Woking's 2023/24 Surrey Counties 5 season ended in the same dramatic way as it started at Raynes Park back in September losing out in the final play of a fiercely contested match.



The hosts welcomed promotion chasing London French who needed a point to secure promotion to secure an immediate return to Surrey Counties 4 following Woking's impressive victory over Raynes Park the previous Saturday.

Woking themselves were able to welcome back several more players from injury allowing Head Coach Mark Rose to take a watching brief as he named a squad of 23.

With a strong wind behind them London French kicked off deep into the Woking half. An uncharacteristic knock on from Carl Jacobz receiving the kick resulted in a French scrum 10 meters from the Woking line. Immediately, Woking were under pressure, and this continued throughout the opening exchanges with the visitors determined to stamp their authority on the match.

Defensively, Woking were working hard with several notable big hits from Jacobz and Charlie Godard stopping the French attacks which resulted in their opponents requiring

lengthy treatment. Eventually, London French's pressure told when they were awarded a penalty in front of the posts which was surprisingly missed.

A few minutes later more French pressure lead to Woking conceding multiple penalties as they struggled in the scrums. The promotion chasers pack camped on the Woking line and eventually crossed over from close range under the posts.

From the restart Woking were able to get a foothold in the game, enjoying time in their opponents 22m. French also had a kickable penalty to extend their lead, but this was missed. Then late in the first half Woking scored their opening try. Good play by the Woking pack, recycling the ball well through multiple phases of play, created the opportunity for scrum half Matt Ralph to feed centre Carl Jacobz who just about squeezed over the line to ground the ball despite the best efforts of 3 French defenders. The conversion out wide was missed.

Disappointed with the inconsistency of their performance in the first half Woking wanted to take the game to the French. However, once again the visitors started the half strongly and took control of the early exchanges and were able to extend their lead with a try out wide.

At this point Woking could have crumbled but instead went on to dominate the next 20 minutes. Half backs Matt Ralph and Mike Aitcheson were becoming more influential in getting back rows Josh Claydon and John Dickie taking the ball at pace, second row Kieran Williamson was also showing well in the loose and centre Finlay Rowe and full back Keihlan Watson were starting to find gaps in the London French defence.

Woking were awarded a penalty which Car Jacobz converted to reduce the deficit to 4 points. Able to rotate the squad, a luxury that hasn't been there all season, Woking continued to take the game to French. More good play from the Woking forwards and backs sucked the defence in to create the opportunity for the returning KJ Nissen to go over. Jacobz converted and Woking now lead for the first time in the match with less than 10 minutes remaining.

Calling for cool heads Woking gathered the restart and recycled well and cleared their lines as Matt Ralph kicked deep towards the London French goal line. As French countered the Woking defence gave away a penalty which allowed the desperate French to gain territory and attacking position. With both sides scrapping to gain the upper hand, the French was awarded a scrum. Knowing it was the final play the ball arrived at the London French inside centre who in a moment of individual skill managed to step the on rushing Woking defence to break the line and score under the posts. As the conversion went over the final whistle went much to the delight of London French and disappointment of Woking.

Post match, Captain Jacob Woods who has had to have a watching brief over the second half of the season due to a knee injury said, "Being able to push a good side like London

French until the end shows our progression over the course of this season. We matched them in every department but couldn't quite close the game out. I am proud of the boys and the work and commitment they have shown this season. Having struggled towards the foot of the table in recent seasons, a 4th place finish is a great achievement and probably exceeded expectations."
